VIMECHIA is an amazing ministry. The government has termed it to be 'viable' as it has such a depth of local volunteer involvement.

The low annual cost per child relates to the degree of volunteer involvement.

We read of the troubles in many places of this world, and surely in places of this large continent of Africa. Certainly, all is not perfect here in Tanzania, but there is peace and progress. Within a culture of encouraging, self sacrificing care young people such as Winfrida and Silas have their hearts set upon a positive future.



GOOD NEWS FROM MAKANG'WA

The first stage of the Evangelistic Crusade at St. John's Church has been completed. The Mission Team has returned to the University of Dodoma – all 180 of them. Now stage two is commencing. This is he time for the nurture and encouragement of the many people who have responded to the Gospel Call. Wonderfully, the way is prepared.

There is a saying which I first heard many years ago, 'What you see (experience here) is what you get (when you return home).' It comes from the fact that many people attend a crusade, seminar, or cursillo type of weekend or program, and then return to the home congregation and find all is so different, subdued, motionless, absolutely scripted. There can be a stark contrast between the life of the fellowship attended and the life of the home congregation. "I am surely not getting it here!" The message was intended to make sure there would be a helpful connection. Frequently there was a let down.

This is not the situation here. The way has been prepared. Congregational leaders have participated fully in the crusade and in all preparation leading up to it. As I type these words on a Saturday afternoon I know there will great joy tomorrow. WE GET IT!

The team from the university was well prepared. They brought their own food. Well, most of it. They had teams arranged for cooking their meals. Then there was the prayer group, musicians, choir, speakers, children's ministry team, and the response/encouragement/dancing for joy (whatever) group! There were people praying in the church building throughout the crusade.

Locally, preparations had been under way for several months. With generous assistance from some of you who receive this posting dorms had been prepared and made secure, lighting installed in two buildings, the environment cleaned, and funds donated for Bibles. (We do need more. Is that a good sign?) An outdoor stage was installed (rock and cement) for the crusade. Local young adults spent two days at the Amani Center gathering dead wood for the cooking fires. Members gathered for prayer and the choirs prepared with enthusiasm.

On the morning of the final day, to demonstrate appreciation for the Amani involvement, many of the mission team came to the Center to see what we do here and to be involved in some hand-on activity. They planted onion seedlings and gathered hay. Then there were photos at the Center housing – MANY photos.

These students are from all over Tanzania. The work of Amani will be spread with the word of faith. Of course, the 'tree' of the God's planting is <u>people</u>: people rooted through faith in Jesus and in a strong response to God's Word. Therefore, maybe the church should resemble a forest, abundant in the fruit of the Spirit, daily refreshed in those showers of blessings we read of in Scripture, and confidently inviting all to come and share in the wonder of its life.

This Sunday morning I preached and celebrated Holy Communion at St. Andrews, Makang'wa. The building was PACKED. At least one third of the congregation were teenagers and young adults! Included in the worship was thanksgiving for the recent marriage of two people. Mandela is from Makang'wa and Prisca from Arusha. They will be living in Dar es salaam. I used my old 'rubber band' illustration. 'You will never know the significance and wonder of your marriage until circumstances t-

e-s-t the strength of your love and commitment.' Pass that test and you will be well on the way to be blessed and to be a blessing – to many.

May you be richly blessed in the Lord and daily strengthen in your faith.
