Soon, appeal information will be sent out in Australia, seeking support for the DCMP – Children's Home. This is for funds to support the basic care of the children: food, education, health care, water and power. Material will be distributed to congregations in the Diocese of Brisbane, and will also be available to individual people. This appeal will bear the endorsement of the Bishop of the Diocese of Central Tanganyika, the Rt. Rev. Dickson Chilongani. Shabani Mwangoda, one of the original street children, has been selected to be the sole Tanzanian youth representative to the



International Youth Leadership Conference, Warsaw, Poland, June 24<sup>th</sup> – July 4<sup>th</sup>. What a wonderful witness he is to the worth of DCMP. He has progressed from the street, through the steps of basic education, to the gaining of a University degree – to being a national representative in Warsaw. This conference is convened by UNESCO. In the photo we see the young Shabani, 15 years, in 2008. Can you perceive the future in his expression? The trip is all expenses paid, however he has to cover VISA costs and personal travel expenses upfront, to be reimbursed in Warsaw. A gift of \$80.00USD would be welcome. He would then have some spending money while in Poland.

Stof Peace, however there are many more children now involved in the congregation. The Children's Choir provided joyful and inspiring music at the Easter Day worship. Now they need our encouragement, which translates into UNIFORMS! A little encouragement goes a long way in the life of a child. A gift of \$8.00, by conversion, provides a uniform for one child. There are thirty four in the choir.



Thank you for taking the time to read through this Report. I hope that you found it encouraging. We do need Good News in our daily lives. I recall being asked to preach at the Catholic Church in Red Lodge, Montana some years ago. When I asked Fr. Keane about this, he remarked, "The congregation needs to hear Good News.
